## Macau to step up anti-graft efforts

acau Commissioner Andre Cheong Weng Chon met with Mainland China officials and pledged to the central government to step up efforts in pursuing corrupt officials and recovering illicit money. He said he would not let Macau become a destination or transfer hub for corruption activities, according to a press release issued by the Commission Against Corruption (CCAC).

Mr. Cheong made the pledge in Beijing on March 30 and 31 when meeting with the Minister of Supervision, Huang Shuxian, who highlighted China President Xi Jinping's administration's determination to crush graft.

"CCAC will continue conducting

its anti-graft work and will continue cooperating with the Mainland's efforts to tackle corruption," the press release quoted Mr. Cheong as saying. "We will co-operate with Mainland authorities in catching fugitives and recovering embezzled money in accordance with the law. We won't let Macau become the transfer station or destination of corrupt officials or laundered money."

When meeting with China's Procurator-General Cao Jianming, Mr. Cheong said Macau would strengthen co-operation with the central government and regional prosecutors' offices, especially with neighbouring regions, namely Guangdong, Guangxi and Fujian, in order to help build a clean administration.
